

## Sanctuary Windows, North Side, Front to Rear



### Deacon Henry Taylor Memorial

Alpha and Omega symbols commemorating our early beginnings and our future. Inscription: Family of James Calvin Taylor. Called "Uncle Henry" by all for his love, kindness, and faith. Grandson of Matthew and Janet Taylor, who came to Londonderry in 1722. Given by his nephew, James Calvin Taylor.



### Rev. David MacGregor Memorial

MacGregor family coat of arms, with Scottish Tartan. Scotch motto: "E'en do bait spair nocht" means *Act carefully but spare nothing*. Dedicated to Rev. David MacGregor, son of Rev. James MacGregore (the first FPC pastor) and Mary Boyd. Given by Mr. James MacGregor Adams of Chicago, Ill. Lists many names, including General George Reid, who attained high fame in the Revolutionary war.



### Thom Family Memorial

The most intricate of the windows. Dedicated to James C. Thom and Harriet Thom by their son, Gen. George Thom, Pinkerton Academy student in 1827 and one of the highest ranking Derry men to serve in the Civil War. The Thom family descended from Dr. Isaac Thom, early Nutfield physician, proprietor of the Thom-Willey Tavern, and the town's first postmaster. The family operated a store in the parsonage.

## Sanctuary Windows, South Side, Rear to Front



### Jennette and Sarah Humphrey Memorial

Beautiful flowers throughout, and featuring the harp and dove. Dedicated to two sisters, humble servants of the church, maiden ladies, and sisters of the venerated and beloved Deacon John Humphrey. Both are interred in Forest Hill Cemetery. This memorial was presented by Mrs. James Calvin Taylor.



### James and Persis Taylor Memorial

Prism in the crown casts a rainbow onto the cross and speakers at the pulpit during services. Dedicated to Deacon James Taylor and his wife, Persis Taylor. Gift of Mrs. Mary E. (Taylor) Fairbanks of St. Johnsbury, Vermont. The largest of all the stained glass windows, it requires additional support in its construction. There is a "hole" in the design by the leaves on the upper right side.



### Charles C. Parker Memorial

Symbols in this window include an anchor and the Bible. Dedicated to Charles C Parker and Sarah Taylor Parker. Charles Parker was the son of Rev. Edward L Parker, Pastor at FPC from 1810-1850 and one of the town's first historians
